A Message from President and CEO Dr. Robin Ganzert

What does it mean to be humane?

We asked our friends, supporters, and colleagues what words come to mind when they envision what is needed to build a more humane world. Here are a few of their answers: caring, respect, kindness, empathy, dignity, fairness, gentleness, peace, safety, justice and love.



We certainly agree. And as America's first national humane organization working to pioneer so many of the key protections for our children and our animals over the past 137 years, we would also add a few words...such as action, courage, integrity, common sense, compassion – and most importantly for the sake of our most vulnerable, *results*.

Over the past century we have worked to end child labor in this country, prevent animal cruelty in communities, ensure the welfare of farm animals, prevent child abuse, protect millions of animal stars in movies and television, expose inhumane conditions in slaughterhouses, advocate for the reform of the foster care system, and save hundreds of thousands of injured and frightened animals on the battlefields of World War I Europe, at Pearl Harbor, and following Hurricane Katrina, the Joplin tornado, the Japanese tsunami and nuclear meltdown at Fukushima, and Superstorm Sandy.

This past year alone in our four major program areas, we have tirelessly pursued the humane mission by:

- Ensuring the humane treatment of nearly 1 billion farm animals an increase of more than 100% in one year
- Serving the children of our military families with Operation Purple and victims of tragedies such as the Boston Marathon bombings through our pioneering animal-assisted therapy program
- Rescuing and sheltering the animal victims of the devastating EF-5 tornado in Moore, Oklahoma, the Colorado floods, and with other humane organizations 250 dogs in the second-largest dogfighting raid in U.S. history
- Conducting groundbreaking humane research to help children with cancer, and national research to save more of the 3-4 million animals euthanized each year by finding new ways to increase pet retention

Our goal today and for the past 137 years has been to measurably, demonstrably and significantly increase the number of children and animals who are protected from harm. We invite you to read through our recent and historical achievements. Without American Humane Association and its legacy of social change, the world would look very different for our children and our animals. Much has been accomplished, but there is much left to be done. We invite you to join us in our work until every last one of our children and animals is safe from cruelty, abuse, and neglect. Together, let's build a more humane world.

Humane Intervention™: Helping Communities in Times of Greatest Need

American Humane Association's Red Star™ Rescue Services was created in 1916 when the United States Secretary of War called upon us to serve our country by saving wounded horses on the battlefields of World War I in Europe. Since then, we've rescued hundreds of thousands of animals caught in disasters, both natural and man-made. In the past year, Red Star™ Rescue ...

- Responded within hours to the deadly EF-5 tornado that devastated Moore, Oklahoma. Red Star™ responders spent more than a month in Oklahoma, helping to rescue and shelter animals impacted by the storm. More than 200 animals were either reunited with their original families or joined with new ones as part of a massive adoption drive at the end of the deployment. Worldrenowned filmmaker Ric Burns's Steeplechase Films created a video documentary which is a lasting tribute to the courage of the Red Star™ first responders.
- Worked to rescue animals caught in the historic flooding in Colorado. Red Star[™] was on the scene working with



Boulder County Animal Control and Code 3 Associates, and rescued 146 animals, including dogs, cats, ducks, chickens and turtles. A photo of a Red Star™ worker made USA Today's Top 10 Photo Galleries for 2013.

- Sheltered and cared for more than 250 animals seized by a coalition of humane organizations in the second largest dogfighting raid in U.S. history. Though the dogs were emaciated and scared even of human touch, they made miraculous progress. Ten suspects from around the Southeast were arrested on felony dogfighting charges.
- Worked with The Weather Channel to distribute lifesaving tips for families, children and pets to 100 million people nationwide.
- Tripled the size of our legendary Red Star[™] animal rescue fleet with two new 50-foot emergency response vehicles to protect animals in both the hurricane-prone Florida/Southeast U.S. FEMA region and the heavily





populated Northeast U.S. FEMA region, which was devastated by Superstorm Sandy just one year ago. Each is designed to house emergency workers and sheltering equipment for 100 displaced animals. The Florida vehicle was made possible by the extraordinary generosity of philanthropist Lois Pope. The Northeast vehicle, which debuted at the New York Stock Exchange and was featured on The Weather Channel, Fox and Friends, The New York Daily News, The Huffington Post Live and other media reaching nearly 300 million people, was made possible by philanthropist Lois Pope, Banfield Pet Hospital, Zoetis, and other major donors.

 Provided communities around the country with 43 firstresponder training sessions to 962 students in FY 2013.
 Volunteers donated 4,920 hours for deployments on top of the 5,745.5 staff hours in deployments.

Meet Chester the dog, a big fan of Red Star™ Rescue

Each and every animal our Red Star™ team rescues has its own unique story, and some provide us with touching memories that last a lifetime. AHA staffer Ken Mountcastle traveled with the Red Star™ team to Moore, Oklahoma after the deadly EF-5 tornado devastated the town in May. Ken immediately rolled up his sleeves and went to work feeding, walking, and caring for the animals in our emergency shelter. One dog was particularly frightened, cowering in the back of his crate. It took several hours of coaxing, but Ken was finally able to get the little guy to come to him and sniff his fingers. Within two days, the pair was inseparable. Chester, as Ken came to call the precious pup, soon recognized that Ken was offering kindness and compassion, and in return Chester gave Ken plenty of licks and tail wags. Like all of the animals in the emergency shelter that were not reunited with their families, Chester was adopted by a new family, where he can continue to experience the compassion of the human-animal bond in a forever loving home.




Humane Hollywood™: Protection for Animal Stars

- Created a Scientific Advisory Committee comprised
 of the country's leading animal behaviorists, ethicists
 and animal welfare scientists for the purpose of
 continually improving our rigorous "Guidelines for the
 Safe Use of Animals in Filmed Media" the platinum
 standard for humane protections and safety in the
 industry. The safety standards have resulted in a
 remarkable 99.98% safety rate for animal stars working
 in the entertainment industry.
- Convened the first Animal Actors Roundtable
 bringing together animal advocates and producers,
 writers and directors from the entertainment industry
 to examine how we may amplify the voice of our
 beloved animal stars.
- Hired a host of veterinarians to serve as Certified
 Animal Safety RepresentativesTM on film and television sets around the country.

Since 1940, American Humane Association has kept millions of beloved animal actors safe, delivering the very highest standards of humane protection.





Meet Zorro, an animal star who is bullish on AHA!

Everyone knows Lassie, Uggie, Flipper, and Mr. Ed, but no matter how famous America's animal stars are (or how humble), they are afforded the same humane protections from American Humane Association's famed "No Animals Were Harmed®" animals in entertainment welfare program, which has been keeping our furry and flippered co-stars safe for more than 70 years. Zorro had a featured scene in the film 2 Guns. Zorro, playing the prized bull owned by the character Papi Greco, was cued with food to look in the direction of a green screen "helicopter" and react. All this was done with movie magic using green screen technology and special effects to make sure the scene was completely safe for the animal star. Our trained Certified Animal Safety Representatives™ followed our rigorous "Guidelines for the Safe Use of Animals in Filmed Media," which has resulted in an astounding safety rate of 99.98% for the 100,000 animal actors we monitor each year. Zorro is bullish on our program!




Humane Research and Therapy™: Helping Military Families, Communities in Crisis, Kids with Cancer, and Shelter Pets

American Humane Association programs are based on science, data and real outcomes so that we may best help those in greatest need. Here are just some of our latest projects designed to help military families, communities in crisis, and kids with cancer:

- While Boston was still reeling from the terrorist attacks at the Boston Marathon, our National Director of Animal-Assisted Therapy, Amy McCullough, and her certified therapy dog Bailey traveled to the bomb site to provide comfort and healing to the city. Our team brought hope and healing to those who were still trying to overcome the grief of the tragedy. Therapy dog Bailey was interviewed by CNN and our dramatic experiences were explored at length by The Boston Globe, CBS, and NPR's *The Diane Rehm Show*.
- Children of military families often have difficulties coping
 when a parent is deployed overseas. These children of our
 nation's war heroes benefit from the healing power of the
 child-animal bond. For the last three years, American
 Humane Association has partnered with the National
 Military Family Association to send animal-assisted
 therapy teams to Operation Purple Camps for military
 families. In 2013, 49 animal-assisted therapy teams

- American Humane Association and Zoetis completed the
 pilot phase of the *Canines and Childhood Cancer* Study, an innovative human-animal bond study exploring
 the benefits of animal-assisted therapy for children with
 cancer and their families. The upcoming full clinical trial at
 five major children's hospitals will produce data that will
 hopefully help give children with cancer and their families
 an improved quality of life.
- Phase II of our groundbreaking study, "Keeping Pets
 (Dogs and Cats) in Homes Retention Study," funded
 by PetSmart Charities, Inc. revealed more than a hundred
 thousand animals adopted from shelters were
 unaccounted for six months later. The study aims to find
 ways to keep more pets in safe, loving homes.
- Our Humane Scholars Program funded critical research
 for advancements in the welfare and wellness of dogs,
 cats, pigs, cows, and the endangered Javan rhinoceros.
 Twenty top students from across the country were
 selected as humane scholars. An innovative
 interdisciplinary Humane Scholars team representing
 medical, veterinary and business school students from
 Texas A&M created a business marketing plan for
 America's top pet, the cat.





The Weather Channel

- In December, American Humane Association and The
 Weather Channel announced a new partnership to help
 communities across America in times of disaster. Together,
 we conducted a national search to find the national
 Weather Channel Therapy Dog who will bring hope and
 healing to communities struck by hurricanes, tornadoes,
 floods, wildfires, earthquakes and other weather-related
 and natural tragedies.
- The first national Be Humane Summit was launched in September, bringing together the country's top thought leaders in the humane movement to examine key challenges and chart the future course of efforts for America's children and animals. The first Cat Health and Welfare Forum featuring the top cat welfare behaviorists and scientists was convened to focus on the needs of America's most popular pet, and plans were unveiled for a translational research study, Decoding Obsessive Behaviors in Canines and Autism in Children, that could lead to medical breakthroughs for both children and dogs.
- A new children's book series, "Horses that Help," was released by Enslow Publishing with American Humane Association.

Humane Heartland™: Ensuring the Humane Treatment of Nearly 1 Billion Farm Animals



American Humane Association was founded on the issue of protecting farm animals more than a century ago. Today, we oversee the American Humane Certified™ farm animal welfare program — the oldest, largest, and fastest-growing third-party farm animal welfare and audit program in the country. The last few years have seen staggering growth for the program, ensuring its place as the national ethical standard for humane farm animal welfare certification.

In 2013 American Humane Association more than
doubled the number of animals under our farm animal
welfare program, from 400 million to nearly 1 billion.
Our program now ensures the humane treatment and
welfare of one in every 10 animals raised on our
nation's farms and ranches every year, including
90 percent of the cage-free egg production in the
United States.

- American Humane Association oversees the humane treatment and welfare of animals on 8,000 farms and ranches nationwide.
- The internationally respected Scientific Advisory
 Committee grew to a 16-member panel representing
 the top experts in animal science, ethics and welfare
 who work diligently to keep the 200 stringent
 standards we demand for each individual species at
 the forefront of humane practices backed by evidence based science.
- A new national study by American Humane Association shows overwhelming popular support by the American people for increased farm animal welfare. Nearly nine in 10 (89%) of the 3,000 respondents surveyed nationwide said they were concerned about the welfare of animals raised on farms and ranches.

This year's winner, Elle the Pit Bull, celebrates life by teaching children to read, visiting the elderly in a nursing home, and giving life-saving dog bite prevention awareness tips to children.















Major Events and Milestones in 2013

BOSTON BOMBINGS - BOSTON STRONG: Our Red Star™ Animal-Assisted Therapy team deployed to help children and families following the terror bombings in Boston.

OKLAHOMA TORNADO RELIEF: Following the killer tornado that devastated Moore, OK, our Red Star™ Rescue team deployed to save and shelter the animal victims of that tragedy.

COLORADO FLOOD RESCUES: Rescue staff and volunteers deployed to help animals caught in the historic floodwaters.

RED STAR™ RESCUE FLEET EXPANDS: Our Red Star™ Rescue fleet tripled in size with giant new mobile emergency response trucks dedicated to the hurricane-prone Southeast and the Northeast FEMA regions. With the generous help of philanthropist Lois Pope, we launched a new 50-foot Red Star™ Rescue Vehicle based in Florida. And one year after Hurricane Sandy battered the Northeast, we delivered another giant rescue vehicle to that region, thanks to Lois Pope, Banfield Pet Hospital, Zoetis, and other major donors. News of the new vehicle was announced at the closing bell of the New York Stock Exchange and was covered by media nationwide, reaching nearly 300 million people.

Meet Lois Pope, Philanthropist and Humanitarian

Philanthropist Lois Pope was presented with the Legacy Award at the third annual American Humane Association Hero Dog Awards™. Mrs. Pope was recognized for her tireless dedication to helping animals, children, and wounded veterans and for embodying the spirit of what it means to be humane. As a member of the American Humane Association Board of Directors, her generous philanthropic contributions to the organization have touched a number of key program areas, most notably the American Humane Association Hero Dog Awards™, for which her Lois Pope LIFE Foundation has served as the show's presenting sponsor.

Mrs. Pope's love of animals knows no bounds, but she is particularly fond of dogs. She loves dogs so much that she once remarked, "Given the choice between a dog or husband I would choose a dog every time because they do not snore, are always willing to give you a kiss and do not ignore you during football season."

A native of Philadelphia, the City of Brotherly Love, Mrs. Pope learned from an early age the importance of looking out for not only her brothers and sisters, but animals as well. She recognizes the importance of saving animals during times of natural and manmade disasters, and has graciously donated the funds for two brand new, fully-equipped Lois Pope Red Star™ Rescue Vehicles. The first truck debuted earlier this year, and though it is based in Palm Beach, Florida, it played a pivotal role in American Humane Association's deployment to Moore, Oklahoma in the wake of the deadly EF-5 tornado that struck in 2013. The second truck was delivered in December and will serve the Northeastern United States from its base in New Jersey.







CHILDHOOD CANCER PILOT STUDY: American Humane Association and Zoetis completed the pilot phase of our "Canines and Childhood Cancer" study, a groundbreaking effort to demonstrate the remarkable therapeutic power of animal-assisted therapy on children with cancer and their families. A full clinical trial at five major children's hospitals is now underway.

ENSURING HUMANE TREATMENT OF NEARLY 1 BILLION

FARM ANIMALS: American Humane Association doubled the number of animals under its rigorous American Humane Certified™ program to nearly 1 billion, ensuring the humane treatment of one in 10 animals raised on the nation's farms and ranches. The program is the nation's first, oldest and fastest-growing effort of its kind for farm animals.

"DOGS RIDE INSIDE": A national campaign to protect more of the 100,000 dogs who tragically die each year riding in the beds of pickup trucks was launched by American Humane Association and Ford Motor Company and reached audiences around the nation and around the world.

CATURDAY: Celebrated a million-pound giveaway of cat litter with Cat's Pride Fresh & Light in the Northeast! We love Cat's Pride!

"CONNECT WITH WEATHER": A national prevention effort by The Weather Channel and American Humane Association reached 100 million people with ways to protect their families, children and pets from natural disasters. A coast-to-coast search was launched to find a national Weather Channel Therapy Dog who we will take to help communities hit by natural disasters.

HUMAN-ANIMAL BOND TECHNOLOGY CONFERENCE:

American Humane Association convened the first national conference with PricewaterhouseCoopers and Merck Animal Health to focus on the transformative impact of innovation and technology and their crossover applications for human and animal health.

LIGHTS OF COMPASSION WEEKEND: A veritable galaxy of stars turned out at Las Vegas' Bellagio Hotel and the majestic home of Bruce and Barbara Lee Woollen for a weekend celebration of compassion for Red Star™ Rescue. Among those lending their star power were Congressman Joe Heck, Lisa Vanderpump, Siegfried and Roy, Wayne Newton, Las Vegas Entertainer of the Year Frankie Moreno, concert pianist Lola Astanova, philanthropist Patrick Park, and Mrs. Howard Hughes.

JAPANESE EARTHQUAKE AID: Following up on our previous emergency aid to the animals affected by the Japanese earthquake, tsunami and nuclear meltdown, we made a major grant to help more than 1,000 pets who are still homeless and issued an eye-opening report to the nation about their plight.

STUDY REVEALS 100,000 PETS MISSING: A landmark study by American Humane Association showed that a hundred thousand shelter pets are missing six months after adoption. Our scientists are examining the results from this survey to increase pet retention rates, keeping animals in forever loving homes.

PRESIDENT JOINS AHA IN OPPOSING BSL: As reported in TIME Magazine and hundreds of other media, President Obama joined American Humane Association in opposing breed-specific legislation (BSL), unfairly targeting certain types of dogs.

PIT BULL NAMED 2013 AMERICAN HERO DOG: Defying stereotypes, Elle, a pit bull who teaches children about dog safety and how to read, won top honors at the 2013 American Humane Association Hero Dog Awards™. Following more than 1 million votes by the American public, the event was broadcast on Hallmark Channel to their 87.5 million subscribers, and the campaign produced more than 3,000 news reports reaching 1.7 billion people worldwide. To top it off, Elle's win appeared on the big screen in New York's Times Square!




Meet Elle, America's Hero Dog!

Becoming top dog is never easy, especially if you have to overcome years of unfair and hurtful stereotypes. So it was especially sweet that a pit bull named Elle was named the American Hero Dog at the 2013 American Humane Association Hero Dog Awards™. Elle won the national campaign by popular acclaim, scoring the most votes in a nationwide contest in which more than one million ballots were cast by the public and a celebrity panel of experts and animal lovers. Elle was honored for her work in teaching children dog safety and working as a therapy dog with children to advance reading skills and to promote literacy.

American Humane Association has worked for years to overturn BSL (breed-specific legislation) and with Elle as the American Hero Dog, it seems that a new day is ahead for the breed that faces misperceptions and prejudice.

Need more proof of the power of Elle? Elle's story was so heartwarming and newsworthy that The Today Show's audience voted it one of the "Top 10 Animal Stories of 2013." Bully for Elle!



SURVEY SUPPORTS FARM ANIMAL WELFARE: American Humane Association released a national research study showing that the vast majority of Americans strongly support the welfare of farm animals.

250 DOGS SHELTERED IN DOGFIGHTING RAID: American Humane Association worked with a coalition of other animal organizations on the second-largest dogfighting raid in U.S. history.

SCHOOL SHOOTING TIPS FOR KIDS: Following the school shooting in Atlanta, our children's experts issued tips to help children across the country to cope.


NATIONAL MONUMENT IN NATION'S CAPITAL: The first National Fire Dog Monument, a lasting tribute to America's arson dogs, sponsored by American Humane Association and State Farm, was installed in Washington, D.C.

INAUGURAL BE HUMANE SUMMIT LAUNCHED: The first Be Humane Summit was launched in Orlando, bringing together national experts to examine issues affecting America's most vulnerable in the areas of agriculture, entertainment, humane research and disaster relief. A groundbreaking study examining the link between autistic tendencies in both dogs and children was unveiled, and the summit hosted the nation's first Cat Health and Welfare Forum, focusing on the unique challenges facing this beloved pet.

NEW TALENT: Global animal health leader John Payne was appointed the new chairman of the board; Dr. Marty Becker ("America's Veterinarian") joined the board of directors, as did international affairs expert Amanda Bowman and international attorney Bill Davis; Renowned veterinarian Dr. Kwane Stewart was brought on as the new director of our Humane Hollywood™ program; National animal emergency expert Justin Scally was named director of our century-old Red Star™ Rescue Animal Emergency Services; and Mary Kay Phelps joined as our new Chief Philanthropy & Marketing Officer. New Senior Fellows who are unparalleled experts in the child welfare and animal well-being spheres joined our work including National Institutes of Health's Dr. Stephen O'Brien, psychologist Dr. Caren Caty, and child welfare leader Suzanne Lohrbach.

PUPPY MILL BAN: Applauded North Carolina Governor Pat McCrory's support of the "Puppy Mill Bill," making it harder for large-scale breeding facilities to operate.

HUMANE HEROES HONORED: A select number of national figures were honored for their work on behalf of children and animals with our prestigious National Humanitarian Medal and Legacy Awards, including philanthropist Lois Pope, country music star Miranda Lambert, Gus Arrendale, Congressman Joe Heck, Roy Horn of Siegfried and Roy, Wayne Newton, philanthropist Patrick Park, and Naomi Judd. 


