HONORING A CENTURY OF LOVE

For almost 100 years, Betty White's greatest passion was to help animals and help ensure that more of them were treated with the love, care and compassion they deserve. When she passed away on New Year's Eve, the world's animals lost a powerful advocate and American Humane lost a beloved friend who championed our mission for longer than any other supporter in our history – seven decades! During her lifetime of work with us, she touched the lives of millions of creatures and, astonishingly enough, even after her death, continued to help furred, finned and feathered friends around the world through the viral #BettyWhiteChallenge, an online campaign to raise funds for animal charities in her name. American Humane, which was the first major organization to promote the challenge, saw a quadrupling in donations and traffic to our website.

In response to the swell of donations that came in to help us save, shelter, feed and protect nearly one billion animals around the world each year, American Humane President and CEO Dr. Ganzert unveiled plans to continue honoring Ms. White by making the #BettyWhiteChallenge an annual event.

"Betty's love for animals was timeless, and our pledge to celebrate that love must be, too," said Ganzert. "Her friendship and passion will never be forgotten."

The organization is also dedicating a special part of its newest lifesaving program to its longtime friend, opening the "Betty White Healing Garden" at the new American Humane Sanctuary, a beautiful 10-acre refuge where animals in need of forever homes as well as veterans in critical need of healing service dogs can find a home, help and love.

During her 70 years of service to American Humane, Betty White acted as a member of our board of directors, supported our "No Animals Were Harmed®" program protecting animals in film and television, lent her services to fund-raising activities, acted as a judge and presenter for the nationally televised American Humane Hero Dog Awards, and served as the chair of our nationwide "Be Kind to Animals Week®," the most successful humane education campaign and the oldest commemorative week in U.S. history. In gratitude, the now 145-year-old charity gave Ms. White the National Humanitarian Medal – our highest honor.

"Betty dedicated herself to protecting and improving the quality of life for so many," Ganzert said. "She has always been a one-of-a-kind phenomenon, and we are honored to have known and worked with her during so much of her truly remarkable life. We will always keep the memory of your fervor and friendship alive, and on behalf of the millions whose lives you have touched, thank you, Betty!"







RESCUE TAILS

For more than 100 years, wherever and whenever animals are in need, American Humane has been at the forefront making a difference – saving, sheltering, speaking up and caring for the most vulnerable in their times of greatest need. Here are a few of the most recent stories of hope you help to make possible.



LUCKY LEO FINDS HOPE AT THE AMERICAN HUMANE SANCTUARY

A friend of American Humane was running errands in Pahokee, Florida, when he witnessed a tragic accident – two kittens run over by a truck. These two kittens were Leo and his littermate, who had been abandoned with their mother in a parking lot. American Humane was contacted and Leo was rushed to an emergency vet clinic in West Palm Beach. Sadly, Leo's littermate did not survive the incident.

Just eight weeks old, Leo was facing a long recovery. He had a leftsided tibiotarsal fracture-luxation, which is essentially a fractured ankle, and had lost part of his tail. He was also infested with fleas and hookworms.


Leo was taken to the American Humane Sanctuary, a new national rescue retreat where those that are broken in spirit can find hope and a second chance at life. At the Sanctuary, Leo received around-the-clock care and was able to heal. Despite the rough start to his young life, he has grown into a rambunctious, happy and healthy five-month-old kitten.

Affectionately known as "Lucky Leo," his injuries haven't slowed him down at all! As his name implies, Leo has the heart of a lion and is a true survivor. He loves to play ball and is an opinionated boy who will always tell you what's on his mind. He'll also curl up in your lap for cuddles and purrs. A spunky, curious kitten with lots of love to give, Leo was finally ready for a home to call his own.

We are thrilled that Leo's luck continued, and he found his own purrfect forever family and he will be doted upon and loved for the rest of his days.

Leo's adopter, Lisa Martin, told us: "Leo came into our lives after losing our three beloved animals within one year. Opening our hearts to Leo was the best decision we could have made. He is a perfect addition to our family and brings so much joy and laughter into our lives. Thank you to American Humane for saving Leo and making our family whole!"

Lucky Leo was the first animal to be adopted from the American Humane Sanctuary, and his story exemplifies our mission for the Sanctuary – to be a refuge of hope and healing for all.


PEANUT EMERGES FROM HER SHELL

HELPING AMERICA'S HEROES

Since 1916, American Humane has been *First to Serve*® those who serve our country by helping support our nation's veterans and the military animals who work for the cause of freedom. Through our Lois Pope LIFE Center for Military Affairs, we reunite retired military working dogs with their handlers, find animals in need of a forever home and train them to become lifesaving service dogs for veterans, advocate for our nation's heroes and much more. Here are just some of the most recent efforts we have made on behalf of both our two- and four-legged veterans.

SERVING THOSE WHO SERVED

For many brave members of the armed forces, coming home is only the beginning of another daunting battle. The invisible wounds of war, including Post-Traumatic Stress and Traumatic Brain Injury, can cause debilitating symptoms in veterans, leading to depression, social isolation and, far too often, suicide.

To help, American Humane created the Pups4Patriots[™] program, which trains pups, at no cost to the veteran, to become lifesaving service animals for those in need. While service dogs are an invaluable asset to veterans with trauma, there are significant obstacles to receiving one. Properly training a dog so they will remain calm and unobtrusive in public areas and help a veteran with trauma symptoms is expensive – costing up to \$30,000 per dog. When cost isn't an obstacle, wait times can still be prohibitively long. Here are the heroes we most recently helped with lifesaving service dogs:



DANIEL & RUBY

Daniel is a U.S. Marine Corps veteran who served from 2002-2007 and was deployed three times to Iraq. He lives in California and was paired with Ruby, a female Labrador Retriever.

"Ruby has been a blessing to me and my family. Since she and I met, I felt a strong connection with her. I have been able to attend a few events that I otherwise never would have gone to. Just being able to reach down and touch her when I am feeling distant or anxious is very grounding and brings me back to the present. She will stand behind me in stores and lean against me when I am feeling anxious. Her calm presence is exactly what I needed in my life. She goes with me everywhere I go and our bond grows stronger by the day. Thank you, American Humane, for providing me with this amazing dog. She fits with my family excellently."






NYLABONE HONORS NEW FILM "DOG" WITH DONATION TO AMERICAN HUMANE



If there was one thing you could ask people to do to improve the world for animals, what would it be?

SAVING EARTH'S ANIMALS

Species around the world are disappearing at an alarming rate in what scientists are calling the "Sixth Mass Extinction." To help stem this terrible tide and protect the world's beloved animals, we launched the American Humane Certified™ program, the first such independent certification for the world's zoological facilities. You can support the vital rescue, rehabilitation and conservation work being done at these institutions by visiting American Humane Certified facilities. Here are just some of the latest victories they have achieved to help preserve Earth's magnificent and disappearing animals:



WELCOME TO THE WORLD!

Brazos, an adorable Asian elephant calf, was born at the American Humane Certified[™] Fort Worth Zoo – an important addition since there are only 30-50,000 endangered Asian elephants left in the wild and at the rate they are disappearing, may soon survive only thanks to modern zoological centers such as this one. When he was born, Brazos was 37 inches tall and weighed 255 pounds. He now weighs more than 500 pounds and is still gaining about two pounds a day in the zoo's new habitat, Elephant Springs, which includes multiple green spaces, a variety of substrates, several watering holes and a 400,000-gallon river in which the animals can fully submerge themselves and swim. We're so thankful that magnificent creatures like these will continue to grace the Earth and prove a source of wonder for generations to come.





BACK FROM THE BRINK

The Puerto Rican Crested Toad was once thought to be extinct but is now making a comeback, thanks to the American Humane Certified **San Antonio Zoo**. Scientists there bred and released more than 5,000 of the critically endangered youngsters back into their native habitat, giving new hope for a species beloved for the long, upturned snout and noble crest above its eyes. Saving these unique creatures is just one of almost 20 research and conservation efforts with which San Antonio Zoo is involved as part of their work to create a global community that loves, engages with, acts for, and protects animals and the places where they live.

IF ONLY WE HAD THIS KIND OF ROADSIDE ASSISTANCE

No one knows how a wild sea lion ended up on Route 94, a busy highway in California, but startled drivers made the right call and alerted **SeaWorld San Diego**, which quickly sent a contingent from its famed rescue team to save the large pinniped. The animal experts were able to safely secure the sea lion and transport it to SeaWorld's comfortable rescue facility, where it was checked in to recover from the ordeal. After a week of close observation and tender, loving care, which included 12 pounds of fresh sashimi every day, the healthy and rested sea lion was returned to the wild - one more success to add to the more than 39,500 animals SeaWorld has already rescued. We wish our roadside assistance company provided this kind of service!

OUR HUMANE IMPACT EXPANDS



The latest is Chile-based Agrosuper, whose Las Cornizas broiler chicken farm is the first in South America to earn certification from American Humane, the largest certifier of animal welfare in the world.


To qualify as an American Humane Certified[™] producer, Agrosuper's Las Cornizas broiler chicken farm had to meet the program's rigorous requirements, including nearly 200 science-based standards covering everything from adequate space to proper temperature, air and water quality, the ability to express natural behaviors and much more. Agrosuper also voluntarily agreed to undergo stringent, yearly audits by expert, independent, third-party auditors to ensure the program's standards are being implemented correctly.

"As an American Humane Certified producer, Agrosuper's Las Cornizas broiler chicken farm will help assure consumers that their food was raised humanely under the science and evidence-based protections established by American Humane," said Dr. Robin Ganzert, American Humane president and CEO. "We applaud their commitment to animal welfare and welcome them to our program as our first South American broiler chicken producer."

"At Agrosuper, we firmly believe that animal welfare is important and crucial for our business. Healthy production goes hand in hand with a responsible attitude towards the animals. For this reason, we are constantly updating our animal welfare policy, adding new trends and different aspects which include animal health and the environment where they are raised," said Guillermo Díaz del Río, CEO of Agrosuper.

The science-based standards used in the American Humane Certified program are determined and regularly reviewed with the help of an independent Scientific Advisory Committee consisting of the nation's top animal welfare experts, animal behaviorists, veterinarians, and ethicists, including renowned farm animal welfare pioneer Temple Grandin, PhD.

During the mid-1920s, with a \$500 loan, Frank Wagner and his brother-in-law, Paul Dutt, started a successful business in Mt. Bethel, Pennsylvania, and Newark, New Jersey, marketing live poultry and eggs. Seeing potential for the fresh poultry business in the South, Dutt & Wagner expanded to Abingdon, Virginia, in 1935. Wagner and Dutt located the business in downtown Abingdon in the old Marshall Produce Company building. This became the home of Dutt & Wagner until 1966, when the headquarters was moved south of town, where the current facility is still located today. 
WHAT'S NEW (AND GOOD) TO WATCH
